Title: Social Sciences Information Services and Resources

Rationale for Inclusion in Curriculum:

The social sciences encompass a broad field of study and research, yielding more than one-third of scholarly publishing in the world. Information generated in the social science disciplines is embodied in a vast array of printed and non-print sources. It is sought constantly by citizens of all ages and occupations, on both the lay and specialist level. Knowledge of the informational apparatus in the social sciences is indispensable for providing professional service in any type of library.

Competencies Expected:

By the end of the course students will be able to demonstrate an understanding of:

1. The structure of the different social science disciplines
2. The information needs of social scientists
3. Their methods of producing and disseminating knowledge
4. The relevant print and non-print sources in the various disciplines
5. The bibliographical, factual, statistical, and other types of information related to different social science disciplines.

Course Methodology:

In this course, students will learn to identify the various disciplines that comprise the field of social science. They will be introduced to the indexes, reference tools, and databases used by social scientists. Students will also learn about the information needs of people in these fields and how they have provide services to meet their needs.
